Teach it

1. Write this on the board

Capitalize proper nouns

Ex:

(proper (proper noun—name) noun—place)

Phil flew to Dallas on (proper noun—name)

Southwest Airlines.

PRACTICE THE CONVERSATION:

- A: Read the sentence, please.
- **B:** Phil flew to Dallas on Southwest Airlines.
- A: Great. Is Dallas capitalized?
- B: It is.
- A: Why?
- **B:** We always capitalize proper nouns. Dallas is a specific place, which makes it a proper noun.
- **A:** Are there any other proper nouns in this sentence?
- B: Why yes, I do believe there are.
- A: Like what?
- **B:** Southwest Airlines is the name of a company, and Phil is a specific person. They are both proper nouns.
- A: So they would get. . . .
- B: Capitalized.
- A: Perfect.

2. Explain:

We capitalize **proper nouns**, including persons' names, specific places, company names, and brands; titles of books, movies, songs, or other works; and names of religions, months, days of the weeks, and holidays. (Have students record these in their journal.)



Look at the example sentence. The underline means I intentionally made a grammatical choice here. The proof above the word shows that I know why I made the choice; I know the rule about **proper nouns.**

- 3. Ask: Who will try out this capitalization rule with me? (Enact the conversation.)
- 4. **Say:** Open to your grammar chart and find <u>capitalize proper nouns</u>. Let's jot down an example on the chart.

Note: On the grammar chart, you'll also find spots to add examples of proper nouns that are titles and religions.

- 5. Project the journal entry and read it.
- 6. Ask volunteers to read the sentences with the **proper nouns** aloud. Ask each of them to explain the rule, that we capitalize proper nouns.
